PREPARING STUDENTS FOR THE CAREERS OF THE FUTURE

Have you driven in or out of Moorhead via Interstate 94 in the past three years? If yes, you may have noticed that the former SAMS Club building has undergone a remarkable transformation. The once-large retail space now boasts a bold orange M and serves as the home of the Moorhead Career Academy.


The Principal of Moorhead High School, Josh Haag, shared that the project is a crucial aspect of the District's strategy to accommodate the increasing number of students in their district. Haag has been a resident and professional in Moorhead for over a decade.



Upon assuming the role of high school principal, the school had close to 1,400 students. Presently, 500 students are enrolled in Kindergarten, and the class of 2024 has 450 students projected to graduate. With an anticipated graduating class of nearly 600 students in 2025, Moorhead Public Schools is taking steps to prepare for future enrollment growth. The Career Academy has been in operation since the fall of 2021, and a new high school is currently under construction, with a plan to open the mid-school year in 2023-24. As they considered the future of the school district, during their decision-making process, the planning team visited Bismarck to tour their career academy. After reflecting on their experience during the ride back, they decided that building an academy for their students was necessary.

What is the most common statement Principal Haag hears from parents?
"I wish I could have taken this class in high school."




With a comprehensive, expansive list of program options, the Career Academy is helping to shape the future of education. The Career Academy offers a variety of study programs such as Business & Entrepreneurship, Information Technology & Design Thinking, Health & Human Potential, Manufacturing, Transportation & Distribution, Liberal Arts & Communications, and Farm to Table. The Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) program in Health Sciences has experienced rapid growth, with enrollment increasing to 95 students for the upcoming fall semester. Most recently, 60 students completed the CNA program. Healthcare providers in the area are pleased with the growing interest in Health Sciences among students, as this will help alleviate the current shortage of healthcare employees. Due to the program's significant growth, the Academy is now hiring a full-time staff member to support the Health Sciences programs.



Haag stated, "When evaluating the courses they would like to offer their students, it has to pass the criteria for being a high demand, high wage, and high skill career." Haag was also excited to share that they have returned the Agriculture and Aviation programming to the Academy. Both programs have been absent for over 30 years. "We live in an agriculture community," said Haag. Our Academy has the opportunity to provide programming to support the needs in our region." During my visit to the Academy, Tom Dryburgh, the Community Outreach Coordinator for the Moorhead Career Academy, provided a tour and expressed his excitement about the programming being developed for Moorhead students. As I explored the impressive facility, I saw room after room of engaging and hands-on programming available to students. Dryburgh informed me that students are eager to attend and spend part of their time at the high school and the remainder at the Academy. They have the option to use their own transportation or utilize District transportation. The only minor inconvenience Dryburgh mentioned was the short travel time required to get to the Academy's location. When inquiring about the future programs at the Academy, Dryburgh shared that Mechatronics will be incorporated into their curriculum. Mechatronics is a fast-growing field and an important aspect of the manufacturing industry. "Nowadays, many industries prefer using robots over manual human labor for assembly purposes," said Dryburgh. "However, we still need people to repair the equipment and for operation."

Located on the second floor of the building, the Area Learning Center (ALC) students now have access to art classes, a gymnasium, and additional courses previously unavailable in their former location. The center can accommodate 100-125 students during the day and 60 students during evening classes designed for employed students or those needing extra credits to graduate.





Community Outreach

As the Community Outreach Coordinator, Dryburgh dedicates much of his time to establishing strong relationships with local community partners. This involves collaborating with businesses keen on joining programming initiatives and participating in job fairs, which are organized in the large multi-purpose room at the entrance of the Academy. The design of this area includes spacious doorways, top-notch air quality control mechanisms, and ample electrical infrastructure. These features enable the seamless placement of simulators and bulky equipment, making it ideal for hosting job fairs. By offering authentic hands-on experiences, students can gain valuable insights that aid them in making informed decisions about their future careers.





Moorhead Career Academy is very focused on the future of its students and helping them discover their interests and passions. By partnering with local businesses and industry leaders, they also provide their students with real-world experiences and connections that can lead to local job opportunities and a more robust local workforce—ultimately bridging the gap between education and employment and contributing to the long-term success of both students and local employers.



STORM DRAIN STENCILING PROJECT AIMS TO REDUCE WATER POLLUTION

Once the snowy streets gave way to melting and concrete in mid-May, National Honor Society (NHS) students Sloanne Petersen and Abigail Strege put their talents to work stenciling "SAVE THE LAKE" near storm drain inlets around Lake Alice. This project is designed to warn residents that dumping in storm drains pollutes lakes, rivers, bays, and streams. The City of Fergus Falls sponsored this project to reduce pollution caused by snow melting and rain as it moves over and through the ground, picking up pollutants along the way (nonpoint source pollutants).

Much pollution in area streams and lakes comes from ordinary, everyday materials, like household chemicals, fertilizers, pesticides, gasoline, used motor oil, antifreeze, and litter. These substances are washed by rainwater from our streets, yards, driveways, and parking lots into storm drain inlets. Contrary to what many people think, these storm drains don't lead to wastewater treatment plants. They carry untreated stormwater directly into area lakes and streams.



The stenciled message **SAVE THE LAKE** reminds citizens not to dump waste into storm sewers or contribute more pollutants to ordinary stormwater runoff by littering, over-fertilizing, or sweeping yard debris into the street. "Every citizen has a role in preventing pollution," said Matt Harrington, Municipal Storm Water Manager for the City of Fergus Falls. "Storm drain stenciling has been used successfully to reduce nonpoint source pollution. These projects work because they get government, volunteer groups, and businesses working together to solve a common problem."

Deliberate dumping of hazardous materials into storm sewers makes the pollution problem worse. Motor oil is often dumped down storm drains, yet just one quart can ruin the quality of 250,000 gallons of water. Oil and other hazardous substances should be recycled; dumping them is illegal in Fergus Falls.

THE YOUTHS

OF PELICAN RAPIDS

Our mission is to lift the YOUTH voices of Pelican Rapids as valued members of the community. We want to see ourselves in the spaces, activities, and events of Pelican Rapids to continue amplifying the power of the YOUTH'S voices to transform our future in the community.

A group of young individuals with a long-term vision for a youth center and short-term goals to arrange monthly activities for teens and young adults in the Pelican Rapids community came together one step at a time. "The Youths" is a group of adolescent and teen students from Pelican Rapids, consisting of individuals from diverse cultures and backgrounds. The Youths was established during the summer of 2022 as a response to the Minnesota Student Survey results that revealed a need for a sense of belonging among students who were not involved in sports or school activities. Nearly half of the student enrollment in Pelican Rapids comprises students of color. This group meets once a week, uses their voices in decision-making spaces, arranges activities, and is learning civic leadership skills. The Youths have already made waves in the Pelican Rapids community, attending multiple city council meetings to introduce their mission of having a voice in community decisionmaking processes regarding their demographic.

Staci Allmaras, Director of the Regional Center of Excellence at Lakes Country Service Cooperative, supports the developing group and is their liaison to the Pelican Rapids City Council. She provides attentive listening and guidance only when needed. The Youths have received a \$7,000 grant from West Central Initiative to work on developing their individual civic engagement skills. They are not yet a registered 501c3 with the state of Minnesota and are seeking the support of a fiscal sponsor, which will enable them to receive grants. During their first presentation on January 10, The Youths' spokespersons requested the Pelican Rapids City Council's assistance in creating a task force to establish a center where teenagers and adolescents can safely gather. The council's response was positive and receptive. Mayor Frazier stated, "We hear your voice and appreciate you coming. That's how you are heard, by coming to the public square, and speaking and letting people know that you are here, that you have needs, and would like to see them fulfilled." Several Council members also acknowledged the Youth's voice. They expressed a desire to provide support through a small fund for community center development, helping to form a task force and assisting with grant writing recommended by The Youths' advisor, Staci Allmaras.

At the January 31st council meeting, The Youths presented a follow-up example of how the Frazee community worked together to provide a safe space for their youth. Allmaras shared that the group is exploring various grant opportunities, working on fundraising plans, developing communications and marketing, and has a long-term vision of a youth center. The next task is to form a community task force to begin strategic visioning.

Mayor Frazier stated about their attendance at City Council, "We are glad you are here. You are our future!" In small rural communities, the youth play a vital role in shaping the future. They bring in new ideas, energy, and talents that can help the community prosper and expand. For small communities like Pelican Rapids, The Youth can help shape their planning for future economic development.

Allmaras is pleased with the group's outreach to their community and the encouragement from the Pelican City Council Members. She expressed that her personal and professional values, beliefs, and passions are intertwined. Allmaras believes that young people possess the power to change the future for the better. "If we value their input in decision-making, create spaces where they feel valued, and help them develop as learners and leaders, our communities will positively impact outcomes for each of our young people," said Allmaras.

WHY DID ALLMARAS BECOME INVOLVED WITH THE YOUTH?

Allmaras shared that in her role at Lakes Country Service Cooperative as the Regional Center of Excellence Director, she lives this out in her professional work through the LCSC mission, vision, and values and vision at the Western Lakes Regional Center of Excellence:

Also newly elected to the Pelican Rapids school board, Allmaras values the school's philosophy that education is a partnership between students, families, schools, and the community. Pelican Rapids Public Schools places a high priority on their students and ensuring community engagement. The district focuses on educating the whole child, which Allmaras appreciates.

Whether in her personal or professional life, there is a strong emphasis on developing systems that enhance outcomes for young people. Allmaras was reviewing the 2019 MN student survey data for their region when she observed patterns regarding student perceptions of caring adults in their communities. This sparked her curiosity, leading her to examine the 2022 MN student survey, which revealed similar findings. In response to the 2022 results, the executive director of the Minnesota Children's Cabinet, Erin Baily, emphasized the need for the prioritization of children, youth, and families, along with a coordinated budget and policy development across state government that advances the needs of every child and young person in our communities. Although Allmaras has used this data to work with school systems, it is not meant to be confined to public education. "It takes a village" is a well-known phrase, so let's begin discussing this matter within our community spaces," said Allmaras.

Pelican Rapids is a remarkable community that embraces diversity in rural areas. While diversity is a fact of life, inclusion is a conscious decision. A group of young individuals is now leading in defining inclusiveness in their community and taking action to enhance outcomes for future generations.

By listening and learning from them, we can provide the necessary support to enable them to lead with confidence and the assurance of caring adults by their side."


