Interim Superintendent Todd Cameron and the Ulen-Hitterdal School Board are pleased to announce that the school has now paid off the building bonds from 1999 that enabled the school to build a new elementary, commons, gymnasium, kitchen, and district office. In December of 1999, Ulen-Hitterdal resident voters passed a building bond of \$7,765,000, with construction beginning in 2000 and completion in the summer of 2002. At that time, bids for the new project came in less than expected. With the remaining construction fund balance and additional handicap and demolition funds, the school could also renovate the auditorium with a sloped floor, theater seats, drapes, expansion of the stage size, and new lights and sound equipment. This allowed for a state-of-the-art theater for student productions, meetings, and school activities. This enabled Top Hat Theatre to begin a performing arts series for the students and community. The school also received \$50,820 in donations to support this auditorium renovation project.

With lowering interest rates from 2002 through 2016, the school was able to refinance the bonds four different times to save \$816,391 in interest. Superintendent Cameron states, "We are excited to complete the school's financial obligation and celebrate this important building project!" Thanks to the school board members, administration, and voters back in 1999 for their passion, dedication, and hard work. This work has helped to keep Ulen-Hitterdal Public School up to date, growing, and vibrant. As important as this is to the students and community, the people involved make the school a great place to learn.

UPCOMING CHILD CARE FACILITY VOTE AT ULEN-HITTERDAL

The proposed \$1,715,000 child care center will be constructed on Ulen-Hitterdal School property this fall, contingent on a favorable vote at the Primary election on August 9. The proposed building size would be 3300 sq. ft., with a target opening in the fall of 2024. The center would provide approximately 52 slots as a State facility, with room for eight infants and 16 toddlers: the remaining children being 3 and 4 years old and schoolage children.

The school recently paid off 2001 building bonds. This allows property taxes to go down this fall on all properties in the district. Therefore, if the new bond is approved on August 9, there will not be a tax increase on this 11-year bond payback.

Then Superintendent Todd Cameron stated, "This is a win/win situation by being able to build a new facility for child care and keep taxes the same as the previous year without an increase."

Portland Public Schools (PPS) is a PK-12 urban school district founded in 1851 in Portland, Oregon. It has more than 49,000 students in 81 schools, one of the largest school districts in the Pacific Northwest.

With highly trained teachers and staff, an engaged parent community, and strong partnerships, PPS is at its highest graduation rate in the last 15 years, and it's enjoying its seventh straight year of enrollment growth. Its Dual Language Immersion program focuses on closing the racial and educational achievement gap by improving reading achievement in native and nonnative speakers.

One in ten PPS' students is in an immersion program.

PPS came to Idea Translations with a large project in mind; they needed preschool and elementary school educational materials translated for their Spanish Dual Language program. They had over ten guides averaging 350 pages each that required translation within eight weeks, just before the beginning of the school year.

Additionally, they had worksheet assets requiring extensive graphic design and formatting.

Idea Translations' team had to work simultaneously with three translation, editing, and proofreading teams and eight graphic designers, all synchronized. The outcome? With the help of Idea Translations, PPS was able to start the school year with their student content ready for their bilingual program. Portland is a pioneer in bilingual early development education in the country, reducing the education gap between the US and other European and Asian countries.

We are now getting our engines ready for the next school year as PPS bilingual education program expands to all elementary and middle school grades.

surrounding area.


Matteson has served as the Fergus Falls Community **Education Program Director for** over 20 years and holds a Master's in Administration & Educational Leadership. Before taking the full-time position at Community Education, Mary worked as an extension educator with North Dakota State University Extension Service in Fargo, in educational marketing for the National Sunflower Association, and in the field of aging as a County Coordinator. At North Dakota State University, Matteson graduated with degrees in Home Economics Education, Textiles and Clothing, and minors in Food and Nutrition and Family Life Education. In May 2001, Matteson applied and was accepted into Minnesota State University Moorhead's **Educational Leadership Program** to obtain licensure as a Director of Community Education.

Fergus Falls Community Education reaches more than 10,000 people annually through classes, services, programs, outreach activities, and youth services. Matteson oversees Drivers Education, ECFE. School Readiness, and before and after-school tutoring. The Fergus Falls School District provides Community Education as an efficient and effective way to offer residents of all ages the opportunity for lifelong learning. "Every day, there is an experience where you reach your clients," said Matteson. "Our vision is to provide opportunities for lifelong learning, responding to community interests and needs, utilizing all available resources to facilitate the exchange of knowledge and wisdom among all members of the community."

In 2006, Matteson was honored with a nomination and received the State Top Community Education Director award. "My goal has been to be the best education communicator possible," said Matteson. Under Matteson's leadership, the Fergus Falls Community Education's program offerings have seen impressive growth. "Part of being resilient is adapting to change," said Matteson. During the pandemic shutdowns, Matteson continued to adapt and find innovative ways to reach the community. Including continued access to the driver's education program. All but 14 Minnesota Drivers Education Exam Stations were closed during the pandemic.

To ensure students and the public had access to take a permit test, behind-the-wheel exam, and CDL exams, Matteson brought local community and legislative leaders to the table who could make it happen. Together they crafted a letter to their local and state legislators to advocate for this vital education component for youth. Within six months, they were able to reopen the Driver's Exam Stations. "We're constantly changing; In January 2021, the Community Education application to administer Web-Based Class D Knowledge tests to driver education students upon course completion was granted. We now can test students who have successfully completed our Driver Education program. I can figure out how to make a program work," said Matteson.



The Community Education staff is friendly, fast, and flexible. There are two full-time employees and five part-time Drivers Education Employees. Matteson said, "All the programs could not be achieved without Amy Ceroll, the Community Education office Secretary and the Community Education Advisory Council, which gives support and direction to the programs." Matteson also stated she enjoys attending the Community Education classes. "I'm always learning!"

- Basic life essentials such as where to find food, transportation, and housing
- Crisis Text Line and other mental health counseling services

These programs provide direct assistance from school leadership to struggling members of the school community with dignity and privacy.

Toni Fuoss was selected as West Central's 2021/22 Support Staff Employee of the Year. Colleagues had the following to say.


- Toni is a jack of all trades and a master of all things.

Students brought bikes and learned the importance of being safe!







Cohort members will participate in a 16-session program focused on state and federal public policy development and the leadership necessary to influence public policy development.
